What's Happening In MacMad

How did you all fare with the recent invasion of worms? All of us can be very grateful that the Mac OS is not as virus/worm prone as Windows.

As of this writing, I have gathered nearly 180 messages into my Worms folder. Some of these are directed to me, others are rejections of messages that were falsely sent using my return address.

I was fortunate to run across the format for a filter for OS X Mail that grabs the nasty messages and places them in my designated Worm folder.

Even though we Mac users are protected, we are not unaffected. Many of us did see impacts on web access speed and incoming e-mail.

A great deal of scorn has been levied at those Windows users who did not download the patches which would have prevented the worm from entering their system. Even more scorn has been heaped on Microsoft for leaving openings in the first place, and for setting defaults that leave ports unprotected.

Yet we in the Mac world must

not get complacent. Yes, it is harder to invade the Mac. Yes, the defaults in OS X are for ports to be closed. Yes, the Software Update will automatically tell us when we need to download a fix. On the other hand, if the worm coders believes that they can invade enough Macs to make it profitable to use these Macs to send out spam, you had better believe that they will try.

An old software adage states, "There is always one more untested path." That is to say, in the extremely complex programs that we use today, it is impossible to test and check everything. So it is probable that someone could find a way into our Macs.

Apple's repeated release of software updates for security fixes is testimony to this.

The reason that I am bringing this up is to remind us all to watch over our systems. We all need virus protection software. My personal justification for buying a dot-Mac subscription is that I like Virex, and it is included. I also have a hardware firewall in the ethernet switch that

is attached to my cable modem. Plus, I recently installed Brickhouse, a program which makes it easier to invoke the firewall built into Mac OS X. This may seem extreme, but when you see the carnage caused by the latest worms, it becomes worth it.

As we move to wireless systems, WiFi or AirPort, we incur another danger. If my ethernet switch were wireless rather than hard wired, it might be possible for someone outside my home to send a signal directly into my computer, bypassing my hardware firewall. That person might then be able to instruct my computer to send out spam, or worse yet, a virus or worm.

MacMad's ByLaws include the article Purpose and Objectives, which states that "The organization shall undertake programs to provide educational assistance and development of materials supporting Macintosh computers and to encourage interest in new activities." We all enjoy our discussions of how to use a program or

Following the formal program, Jim talked about our coming Twentieth Anniversary, and some of the options for celebrating it.



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OSX Friendly Genuine Fractals PrintPro 3 Allows CMYK Printing and Much More

Genuine Fractals Pro 3 & Genuine Fractals plug-in is used with Adobe Photoshop or compatible software that enables users to scale (enlarge or reduce) images using advanced proprietary Fractal technology. This saves time by working on medium-size original files for high-resolution output and encodes smaller files (reducing file size while retaining quality of original) from screen-resolution images ideal for Web display. What is even better, is that it works in OS X with any of the compatible programs!

Genuine Fractals PrintPro 3.0 extends that color space to include CMYK and CIE-Lab color.

When using Genuine Fractals for large-format prints, it is not necessary to scan at the output resolution. Only 15-25MB of data is needed to capture an image for almost any size output. For example, a 4" x 5" transparency can be scanned at 600 dpi to produce a 20MB file. The image editing can be done at that scan resolution, then encoded into the .STN format. Depending on the image, the encoded file will be 5-10 MB. Now, if the image needs to be output at 450MB and 60MB, both resolutions can be generated from the same encoded file. For smaller print-quality output, such as from a digital camera, start with a source file that is

smaller. Let's say it ranges anywhere from 3.5-9MB and encode that to between 1-5MB, and then render the image to 20MB or more. Smaller source file sizes can be encoded if desired.



LizardTech Genuine Fractals Print Pro is easy to use. Simply save the original image file in the Genuine Fractals .STN file format. This will benefit you in two ways:

- 1) The file will become more compact.
- 2) The image can be reopened larger than the original file,

used with any application that fully supports the Adobe Photoshop File Formats API (Application Program Interface). This includes Photoshop and Photoshop LE, PhotoDeluxe, and Jasc Paint Shop Pro 7.0.x.

You are able to save files in two ways; Lossless & Visually Lossless. Lossless compression will result in approximately a 2:1 to 4:1 reduction in file size, depending on image complexity, while allowing expansion back to the exact original file, pixel for pixel. Visually Lossless compression results in a file size reduction from 5:1 to 10:1, depending on scaling factors and image complexity.



Lossless gives you an encoding ratio of 2:1 - 4:1. This will give the best results if you wish to produce high-end pictures. Visually Lossless gives you an encoding ratio of approximately 5:1 - 10:1. Use this for sending family pics over the net also good enough to produce quality 8x10" photos.

Digital camera users have the ability to encode with the lossless option and rival the resolution of conventional 35mm cameras. By encoding a 460k photo, which makes a nice looking 4x5 picture, Genuine Fractals allows you to enlarge the same photo to 8x10 or larger without losing any integrity and from the same file!

Professional photographers, service bureaus and digital

artists have advantages too. The main idea is to be able to save in smaller files and print larger without losing any quality. I had one member of Indian River Photography Club tell me he saw things he didn't notice when he had the same pictures enlarged at a photography studio. "The images and detail were that much sharper."

If you download the program from the internet www.lizardtech.com you can also download a manual in .pdf format. You can also order a cd which comes with a printed version of the quick start guide and the more detailed .pdf manual.

Minimum system requirements: The image size that can be saved or opened is limited only by computer resources, including RAM and

disk space. The following are minimum requirements for working with Genuine Fractals in Photoshop.

- Macintosh: Mac OS 9 or later, and Adobe Photoshop 6.0 or later.


More memory allows a user to work with larger files. LizardTech recommends 128 megabytes of installed RAM for working with large files.

Note: *Genuine Fractals supports alpha channels and clipping paths but currently does not support multiple layers in the same file. Files must be flattened before encoding.*

Note: *Genuine Fractals does not currently support 16-bit mode. We suggest that you use 8-bit for now.*

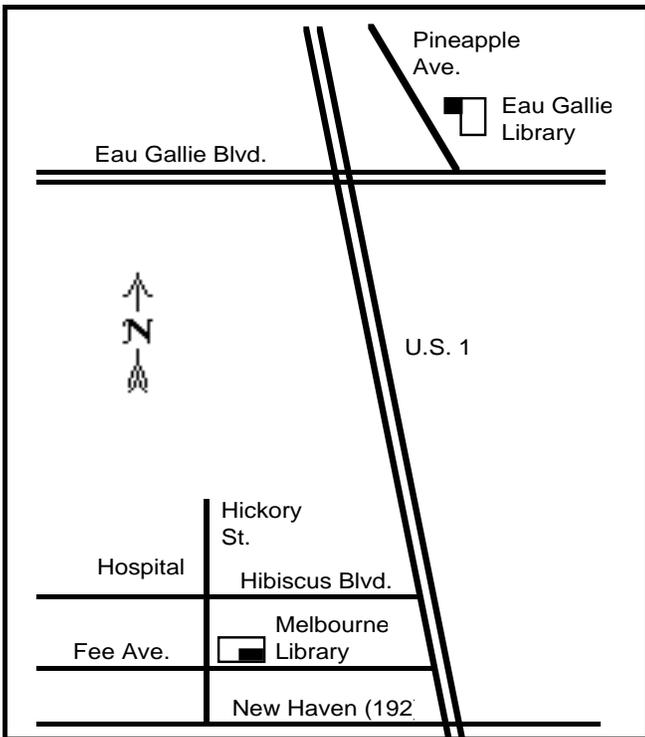

Enjoying the iTunes Music Store?



iTunes makes this easy. Using CDs or DVDs, for example, you can store approximately 150 songs on a CD or as many as 1500 on a DVD.
