

About Last Meeting, May 18, 2004

Jim Staal called the meeting to order at 7:08 pm with 17 people present. Theresa Moore was drafted to take notes for this meeting. Jim pointed out that we still need someone to step up and take on the duties of secretary. A quick poll showed that most attendees are now using OS X, but about three still use earlier versions. One member shared that Nikon gave a class in Orlando that he felt was worth the \$149 to attend. Although the seats were hard, photojournalists led the class for several informative hours.

Jim announced that the next meeting would continue with the digital photography presentation and group discussion. He then introduced Roger Scruggs of Roger Scruggs Films who gave tonight's presentation.

Roger first did an overview on Adobe Photoshop discussing what it is and what its advantages were. He pointed out that Photoshop has the largest support base of the photo editing tools as well as being the most highly developed. There are many reference books and web tutorials for Adobe Photoshop. Roger then emphasized the importance of having a good filing system for your digital photos before you even begin taking pictures. Next, Roger discussed the recommended order for editing your photos: 1) crop your photo 2) add text such as date and loca-

tion 3) do your color balancing 4) flatten the layers 5) use the unsharp mask. The image size you save it in depends on if it is for email, 4x6 prints, or a full screen. Next, he gave a demonstration of an advanced tutorial that is available on CD called Adobe Photoshop 7 "Light Painting Techniques" by Jim DiVitale. Finally, Roger showed some of the basic tools in Adobe Photoshop such as Select, Crop, Erase, Paintbrush, Text, and Quickmask.

Jim then announced that the next meeting would include other tools such as iPhoto and ArcSoft. The meeting adjourned at 8:25 pm with some members agreeing to go to Bennigans for after the meeting.
